# OUR PURPOSE AND VISION

As a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO) based in Inverness, RASASH are the only specialist sexual violence service in the Highland Council region.

Established in 2014, RASASH is dedicated to:

#### **Providing Specialised Support:**

Offering free, confidential, and specialist support and information to individuals aged 13 and above affected by sexual violence in the Highland area.

## Preventing and Eliminating Sexual Violence:

Proactively working to prevent and ultimately eliminate sexual violence within our community.

## Building Partnerships for Change:

Collaborating with partners to improve the way society and services respond to survivors of sexual violence.

## OUR MISSION





#### **Accessible Support:**

Ensure anyone affected by sexual violence in Highland has access to free, confidential, and specialist support through RASASH's dedicated services.

#### **Informed Empowerment:**

**Inform and empower survivors about their rights** with the expertise of RASASH's specialised criminal justice team.

Provide advocacy **to navigate the criminal justice system**, ensuring survivors have access to information and are listened to.



#### **Fear-Free Community:**

Create a community where **people can live without fear of sexual violence**, across Highland and beyond.

#### **Healthy Relationships for Young People:**

Support young people in **developing healthy, consensual relationships** with the guidance and resources offered by RASASH.

#### **Partnerships and Training:**



**Collaborate with various stakeholders**, utilising RASASH's expertise to create a united front against sexual violence.

**Provide specialist training** on trauma-informed approaches to ensure survivors receive the best support across all services.



## WHY RASASH IS NEEDED



In the Highlands, there has been a concerning increase in sexual crimes. The year 2021-22 witnessed a disconcerting 15% increase, as reported by Police Scotland. However, with only 1 in 5 survivors expected to report to the Police, this figure is likely to be significantly higher.

Sexual violence is a pervasive issue with profound, life-changing consequences for survivors. It can affect their emotional and social development and hinder them from reaching their full potential. Survivors often grapple with depression, anxiety, post-traumatic stress disorder, suicidality, eating disorders, and substance misuse.

In the Highland region, survivors face the added challenge of living in rural, 'fragile' communities. These often lack economic opportunities, have below-average income levels, problems with transport, and limited service provision. Without adequate support, many survivors find it difficult to engage in education or employment, and resort to harmful coping mechanisms.

**Early intervention is essential** to enhancing the life prospects of survivors of sexual violence and mitigating the effects of poverty.

RASASH plays a pivotal role in doing this in the Highland area, offering vital services and resources to survivors, in-person and remotely. By providing free emotional support, advocacy and outreach work, RASASH help survivors to navigate the challenges they face and rebuild their lives. Additionally, RASASH contributes to raising awareness, challenging societal attitudes and advocating for change to combat sexual violence effectively.

RASASH's efforts in intervention and prevention are pivotal, not only in healing survivors but in safeguarding the future of the Highland community.

## CASE STUDY 🔂



### SANDY'S STORY OF HEALING

Sandy\* experienced childhood sexual abuse inflicted by a family member. Despite maintaining a facade of normality with marriage and a family, Sandy was silently struggling - experiencing dissociation, post-traumatic stress, and resorted to alcohol to cope.

**With emotional support sessions**, Sandy, who was initially sceptical of how RASASH could help, embarked on a journey towards healing. Although some doubt lingered, their commitment to "just one more" session became a lifeline. As time unfolded, Sandy witnessed **incremental improvements**, finding the strength to reveal more of themselves in each session.

These subtle victories transformed into pivotal milestones. With newly found confidence, Sandy joined a local singing group that became a place of refuge and offered a glimpse of a life that was not ruled by the abuse they endured. Empowered by support, Sandy reshaped their life – establishing boundaries at work, carving time for personal interests, and confronting the unresolved grief surrounding their parent's death.

Sandy expressed appreciation for the non-judgmental, safe, and empowering environment at RASASH. Despite previously trying other therapeutic groups and services, Sandy shared that this was the first time they felt anything had truly 'worked' for them. Sandy's story highlights the profound impact of person-centred, specialist support.

## **OUR SERVICE**

For nearly a decade, **RASASH** has been working towards the prevention and elimination of sexual violence. We're striving to create a safer environment while offering vital support and advocacy for survivors.



- Our free and confidential support starts from the age of 13 and is tailored to meet the individual needs of all survivors.
- We support all genders and offer a safe and welcoming space.
- Our support extends to non-abusing family and friends and other professionals who may be supporting a survivor.
- We have received over 1,500 referrals, from across Highland.
- We have reached over 15,000 young people aged 11-25 across the school and youth network through our sexual violence prevention workshops.



Our **Support Line**, a lifeline for many, receives around **2,000 contacts annually**. Survivors can call, text and email us for support.

Our specialist Support Workers provide tailored, therapeutic support in one-to-one sessions in person or remotely. This includes our Outreach service which travels across rural Highland providing support sessions within communities. This ensures accessibility and support for all.

Workers use various approaches such as art, journaling, and for younger survivors, play, to create a safe and confidential space for healing.



Seeking criminal justice after sexual violence can feel confusing and overwhelming. Our Advocacy Workers help guide people through the legal process. This can include:

- attending police statements and Video Recorded Interviews(VRIs)
- attending Video Identity Parades (VIPERS)
- communicating with the police and courts
- helping survivors access security measures for their home
- arranging court visits and providing court support

#### We also provide post court support such as:

- helping survivors access criminal injuries compensation
- making sure survivors are aware of the victim notification scheme
- communicating with parole boards to find our about sentences and prison release dates.



## **OUR SERVICE**



At the heart of RASASH's mission is the prevention and elimination of sexual violence. We deliver the national prevention programme in schools, challenging harmful behaviours that perpetuate sexual violence. Our aim is two-fold – to prevent sexual violence from happening in the first place and to reduce its traumatic impact by increasing access to support for children and young people.

An important part of our prevention work includes trauma-informed training for educational staff and national programmes that help embed a culture of zero-tolerance (Equally Safe at School and Equally Safe at Colleges & Universities). We also deliver training to other statutory and third sector organisations to improve responses and support to survivors in the community. Furthermore. we facilitate and nurture youth-led activism through our Stand Up Ambassador group, who passionately campaign to raise awareness and prevent gender-based violence in their local communities.

## CASE STUDY 🔂

#### ALEX'S PATH TO JUSTICE AND HEALING

Alex\* was sexually assaulted by a stranger in a public place. Sharing this traumatic experience with their Social Care Worker, Alex was guided to reach out to RASASH's Support Line.

Once connected with RASASH, Alex was linked with their Advocacy Service to navigate the complexities of reporting the assault. Initially hesitant about involving the Police, Alex found reassurance and understanding from their Advocacy Worker, who emphasised that the decision was entirely theirs to make.



After careful consideration, **Alex chose to pursue justice** and their Advocacy Worker facilitated the process, contacting the Police on their behalf and arranging for a statement to be taken in the safety of Alex's home. Throughout this process, **Alex's Advocacy Worker remained by their side, offering support and ensuring they felt empowered.** 

As the Police investigation unfolded, Alex learned that her perpetrator was also charged with assaulting another person in a strikingly similar manner. **Alex's Advocacy Worker helped them grasp the legal nuances**, in particular in cases where there are multiple victims.

Alex attended a video identity parade at the Police station, accompanied by their Advocacy Worker. The experience was distressing, but having support there to debrief afterwards provided a sense of comfort.

Alex's Advocacy Worker continues to provide guidance and encouragement as they navigate the complexities of the legal process and works towards healing. In addition to legal support, Alex attended emotional support sessions provided by RASASH with plans for further session in the future.

Alex's story underscores the **vital role of Advocacy Services in empowering survivors of sexual assault**, offering not only practical assistance but also invaluable emotional support on their path to justice and recovery.

## CASE STUDY 🚱

### JAMIE'S STORY OF EMPOWERMENT



Jamie's\* journey with RASASH began a few months after they endured a traumatic sexual assault by a peer at college. The assault happened while Jamie was just a teenager.

Jamie felt unable to travel to RASASH's office in Inverness after the assault, but knew that online support would not work for them.
RASASH was able to offer face-to-face support via its outreach service. An Outreach Worker travelled to Jamie's hometown to meet them in a confidential place where they felt safe.

During their sessions, Jamie felt able to process the complex emotions they were feeling with their worker by their side. The RASASH worker helped Jamie to accept that the assault was not their fault and what they were feeling was a normal reaction to trauma.

The sessions also provided a safe space for Jamie to **explore the possibility of reporting the assault**, a decision that felt scary and overwhelming. Within this person-centred and confidential environment, Jamie felt able to **navigate these considerations** without the fear that the decision would be made for them.

Jamie's engagement with RASASH extended beyond personal healing. It uncovered a deep-seated desire to speak out against sexual violence, gender inequality, and patriarchy – a newfound voice and activism that blossomed within the support sessions.

Content with finishing their emotional support sessions, **Jamie planned to seek advocacy support from RASASH for reporting the assault**. Jamie's story reflects not only their personal growth and resilience but also highlights the **transformative power of specialist emotional support and advocacy**.




